Thoughts In Solitude

As was mentioned in the May issue of **Raven's Bread**, our solitary environs is a cherished gift that opens our awareness to God's Presence in nature, out of whose womb we have emerged and toward which we are now merging again as one. How to count backwards? Only after two is there One but One is before two. And One is fun, fun, fun!

Who wouldn't want to be in this intimate love affair God is initiating with us from moment to moment? Is there some other reason to be in existence? I am always overjoyed to discover so many hermits reading **R.B.** whose primary "fun" is this treasured love relationship that will never cease to be. It is so pleasing to have the experiential contemplative dimension of humanity held up as the epitome of what not only hermit life is about but what every other calling from God is pointing to. No matter what vocation or religion we adhere to, we are all oriented to oneness in our intimate, experiential and unitive love relationship with God, ourselves, others and creation. Our Trinitarian God is a love relationship and so is life. God comes to us disguised as our life. Rahner was right: "The Christian of the future will be a contemplative (mystic) or s/he won't be a Christian at all."

Maybe Keating would say that God is constantly taking the initiative by kissing each of us moment by moment in our daily lives. By welcoming and being aware of his kiss, we automatically return his tender love to Him. In giving his love, God is also receiving it.

All major religions are about divine union (Love) and that is exactly what the contemplative experience is about. Unless the solitude/silence of the hermit is but a means to open awareness experientially to God's moment to moment communion and intimate love affair with us, these means are coming up short.

Everybody in our country needs to eat a few of Wood B.'s spiritual hermit cookies to "taste and see" the goodness of Being (aliveness-existence forever). To heal our environment (collective ego), we begin by healing our

(angry) selves, our individual egos. And we can't fix our ego with another ego (so says Einstein, the contemplative), but only by realizing that we are more than this counterfeit, illusory ego self. We don't have to waste time beating up on our ego but we have to see it for what it is and it is not who we really are. Merton says his ego is where he lived a lie. His remedy for this lie was the Truth experienced in contemplation where we light the candle of our True Self (God living in us as us) and shine brighter than the sun. Then there is no need to curse the shadows of sinful ego self because the darkness is automatically dispelled by the brilliance of this "lightsome divinization" that we truly are.

How sad that not only Christianity but other religions have lost or never even acknowledged the gift of our innate contemplative consciousness that is the experience of God as us. Panentheism is not pantheism. If everyone's primary work was Wood B's "spiritual stimulus package," there would be more inner peace and even more jobs! It seems to me that everyone is complicit in the "ego mess" we have created by not becoming who we really are. Institutionalized religions (including Christianity) are doing little to bring us beyond our ego. Still prevailing in religion is the dominant collective ego protecting itself and giving birth to the clinging, insincere children of power, prestige and possessions.

Merton's question is relevant. How do we light the candle in people (rather than curse the darkness) by telling them they are shining brighter than the sun? Answer: Shine!

A Word From Still Wood



One of our summer delights is watching the antics of the humming birds. In early May, we put out a feeder filled with bright red nectar and eagerly watch for the first "hummer" to buzz in. We often have an early group of migrating hummingbirds refreshing themselves for a push further north. Then the feeding station is quiet until our local birds show up from their southern home. This year we noticed that although we caught glimpses of them flitting around the honeysuckle, they were not frequenting the feeder.

Karen finally decided that something was not right and took it down. After washing it thoroughly, she enriched the nectar by boiling up water with a higher percentage of sugar. When she re-hung the feeder, she was astonished and delighted to see hummingbirds investigating this fine new "flower" within twenty minutes! How did they know? Obviously, the little creatures are equipped to detect sweetness wherever it can be found, and even more astonishing, to know if there are sufficient calories to sustain their rapid metabolism. Their wings whip through the air faster than the eye can see. When the alpha male dives at another hummer, we often hear a high pitched whistling caused by the speed of his descent.

By late summer, we may have as many as a dozen hummingbirds flitting, diving and ducking around the feeder. The smarter ones wait until the dominant male is occupied driving away some other bird and will flit onto the

other side of the feeder for a few anxious sips before he returns. We can't help wondering when Alpha gets to drink since he's so busy chasing everyone else away, he seldom has a moment to alight and sip. Even when he is still, his little head is constantly scanning the area for any unwanted table mates. The social life of humming birds not only circulates around food, it seems that table fellowship is a critical issue.

We hope our readers savor what **RB** serves up! Recently, the issues have been rich with your contributions and many new readers are joining our ranks. We are so grateful to have such an active readership for this is what creates the sense of community that we cherish. **RB** offers the option of connection without joining, companionship without intrusion and of guidance without judgment.
