Thoughts In Solitude

I have longed for the simple life but find that when I try to get away from it all, I end up taking it all with me. What causes such yearning to arise? First, it is a desire to escape, to leave the problems of this noisy society behind and live the simple life. Second, it is a desire to find the silence, solitude, and serenity that leads to a profoundly spiritual experience of being together with God.

The first problem is noise. There is external noise from highways, industrial noise, and technological noise. There is internal noise in the spirit as well. Stress, hurts, broken relationships, and lack of forgiveness impact the soul. Add to this the urgency driving us to perform.

In 1927, Max Ehrman wrote a poem titled, "Desiderata." It begins: "*Go placidly amid the noise and haste, and remember what peace there may be in silence.*" Further on it reads: "*Avoid loud and aggressive persons, they are vexations to the spirit.*" The wee small voice of the Spirit says: "*Be still and know that I am God.*"

Noise is a peace robber because it creates such a racket you cannot hear this still small voice. We also lose our serenity through fear and anxiety. We are forever trying to live up to an artificial level of performance that is impossible to attain. This yields frustration and dissatisfaction, destroying our hope. Proverbs 13:12 says: "*Hope deferred makes the heart sick.*" I add, "*Hope eliminated kills.*" Everybody is looking for peace. Our restless hearts are wandering to and fro seeking this elusive commodity. We try to cut back on scheduled activities but obligation piles on obligation. The life you lead is not your own but a performance carrying out other people's expectations. Failure to fulfill their plans leads to anxieties. Another thing that impacts my peace is interruptions. I tend to be a linear thinker so interruption is like pushing the "Reset" button and starting over.

Finding solitude is a major problem. I have known those who claim they would be happy living under a bridge alone. On the other hand, I have a good friend who, after his wife died, said, "I have never been alone and I don't want to be – it scares me!" Some people can't stand solitude. They crave people around them. They even sleep with the radio or TV on!

In an effort to get away from it all, some go on retreats. They simply trade one crowd for another. Life is still structured: up at a certain time, eat at a certain time, bed at a set time. They are just as regimented and driven as always. Jesus had peace always. He slept in the midst of the storm and yet could be alone with the Father in the midst of a crowd. The search for solitude, serenity and simplicity is highlighted in the song: "Simple Gifts"

'Tis the gift to be simple, 'Tis the gift to be free, 'tis the gift to come down where you ought to be. And when we find ourselves in the place just right, it will be in the valley of love and delight." This 150 year old church hymn speaks of simplicity, humility, freedom and repentance. When this is achieved, we will find ourselves at peace in God's perfect will.

We have discussed the four S's: Silence, Serenity, Solitude and Simplicity. We sum up with a fifth – Surrender. Without giving ourselves up and relying totally on the grace of God, we cannot achieve the serenity we seek. Surrendering to God begins with a decision....deciding here and now to let God have His way with me. Beyond this initial decision are the daily disciplines of reading and studying God's word; talking to Him in prayer, and listening for His response. Memorizing Scripture and keeping a daily journal are additional aids in our search. The way to escape the complexities and vexations of life is to know God, spend time with Him, and submit to His direction. The soul that enjoys this silence, solitude, serenity, simplicity and surrender to God reminds me of another old hymn: "*I come to the garden alone...*"

You cannot come as a group, a church or denomination, not even as a family, but alone. Another hymn says: "*All to Jesus I surrender ... all to Him I freely give.*" Surrendering starts anytime we choose ... even now.

We have grown much ourselves as we have delved deeply into how be poor in spirit, how to mourn, to be meek, to hunger for holiness, to be merciful, single-hearted and peace-makers, as well as to be willing to accept the misunderstanding (persecution) which comes our way. Eventually, we hope to offer some DVD’s which will collect our programs into convenient units.

Our column this month seems much like a “**Raven’s Nest**”, woven of the many materials which compose this August issue. May you all feel as blessed as we have by this sharing!


