Thoughts In Solitude

I have deliberately chosen to spend some days of annual leave in solitude and silence where I am able to experience a level of freedom to simply "be". I find God in nature as I remove withered plants and sweep up leaves in my garden, experiencing the death and decay of autumn and the approach of winter. I go back into the close confines of my little oratory where I experience being held within the Heart of Jesus. I am reminded of the presence of Mary, and surrounded by images of the holy ones I revere. In physical solitude I am able to expand beyond the confines of my "enclosure" into the vibrant awareness of all my spiritual companions. Silence is essential for listening and for "tuning" our souls so they harmonize with the symphony of the universe and the Communion of Saints.

I'd like to pluck a few "strings" of my Carmelite tradition. In our silence we stand alongside the prophets of the Old Testament. Elijah stood before the face of God in order to pray on behalf of the people and in order to speak to the people on behalf of God. Elijah also withdrew into the silence of the desert. At Horeb, after experiencing the fire and earthquake, during which he hid in the cave, he came out and heard the "sound of sheer silence." We, too, stand before the face of God like Elijah in silence to hear His Word. Sometimes that silence can be deafening!

In the family of Carmel, we are especially dedicated to Our Lady which means sharing in her silent pondering and reflection. The Incarnation was brought about within the silence and hiddenness of Mary's womb. St. John of the Cross wrote: "*The Father spoke one Word who was His Son and this word He is always speaking in eternal silence. It is in silence that the soul must hear it.*" Our daily life has to be pregnant with silence in order for God's Word to be born in our lives.

St. Therese of Lisieux was drawn to silence from her childhood. She would play at hermits with her cousin, Marie, keeping silence as they went about their tasks. When she was at school preparing for her First Communion, she says that "*on holidays when I was left to my own devices... I got behind my bed where there was an empty space in which I could shut myself away with the curtains, and there...well, I used to think...about God and life and*

eternity...". Silence didn't just happen for her after she entered the monastery. It is something that she had grown into, or which had grown within her.

Another Carmelite who grew into silence during her youth was Blessed Elizabeth of the Trinity. Before she could enter the Carmel of Dijon, she wrote: "*As I cannot break from the world and live in solitude, give me at least solitude of heart...Solitude and silence are so precious.... One can always enjoy interior solitude and silence, for what can distract a heart possessed by love? Noise reaches no further than the surface, deep down there is only Him!*" That silence is not just physical solitude and absence of noise, but is something which we can practice as we go about our daily tasks. Blessed Elizabeth discovered that silence had a music all of its own, that can be found within the enclosure of our hearts.

This silence and interior solitude is something that can be shared with the world as we quietly keep our souls in the loving Heart of God. That experience is often perceived in darkness, the warm maternal darkness of the womb, the spousal night-time intimacy of the heart, or the night of abandonment or absence of the Beloved. Silent love and intimacy with the Beloved is experienced in the solitude of prayer yet also in our daily life in the world.

With Brother Lawrence of the Resurrection, I can take my solitude with me. I can do this when I am out and about in my car, cleaning the kitchen, cooking, or in my office at work. It is simple to be recollected, to bring myself before God by "keeping the soul's gaze fixed on God," to listen always for the music of heaven above the discordant noises that distract me. In short, silence, solitude and recollection form the atmosphere of the spiritual life of anyone living the eremitic charism, creating the ambiance needed for that mutual loving gaze of the Lover and the Beloved.




