invited to yield my hopes, desires, and aversions, and rest in God's ever Present all-inclusive well-making Now."



Recently we were invited to do a Zoom Presentation to a local group with an impressive name: AWE—Asheville Wisdom Exchange. We were delighted to do so and especially enjoyed the Q & A that followed. Let us share with you some of the reflections we offered the group.

"What we *see* is enhanced immensely by what we *hear* and we can only really hear when we ourselves are silent. Seeking and finding silence around us is simply a doorway, a pathway, a means to access *inner* silence. The discomforts of inner silence are essential preconditions we must endure until they gradually transform our consciousness

into an inviting, tranquil, and even serene sense of aloneness. Arriving at solitude takes time. We must first move through loneliness. Once this is accepted we are able to listen and hear what is going on in the outer world around us and the inner world within us. Silence is not easily attained. It requires focus. The discipline of living in the present moment can be what turns isolation into solitude.

We are here; here and now. Deeper than our distress, we find a silent waiting that holds our spirits in peace. It is amazing how pictures in our mind affect our feelings and thoughts. Using imagery to create quiet within us is an easy way of finding Silence. We cannot force our minds into a state of tranquility but, as Pierre Lacout wrote, "There is no obstacle which, once recognized and understood, cannot become the starting point for a new leap forward."

One such obstacle which we find troubling and view with growing concern is how our society as a whole seems to be opting for *connection* at the expense of *communion*. Unless we start reminding one another that we must at times disconnect to experience silence and solitude, it will be less and less possible to recover and restore community. If we recognize this dynamic, it can be the springboard for a renewed awareness of how essential "communion" is for survival in our world.

As we approach the season of the year meant to be one of communion and celebration but which often leads to distress and exhaustion, we need to come to the quiet...daily: to focus, to relax. How? We challenge you to find a near-at-hand site where you can shut out the noise and endless claims on your time and attention. Maybe disappear into a closet; lock the bathroom door; hide under the cellar stairs if necessary and just BE — no smartphone allowed. Whatever your worries, even they can be set aside for awhile. Surely you can find fifteen minutes that will allow you to find Love and Joy. Let this practice be your "Christmas present" to yourself.

Wayfarer Books announces the publication of FACING ARIDITY
Finalist for the 2020 Prism Prize for Climate Literature by
VCUarts Qatar Associate Professor Diana Woodcock




Facing Aridity by Diana Woodcock features poems inspired by research expeditions and residencies in Alaska, the Arctic Circle, the Everglades, and southern Africa; and by fifteen years spent living in Arabia. Tinged with sorrow, they offer hope as they wring out lyrical beauty from the beleaguered yet resilient natural world. Rooted in truth, they zoom in closely on the negative effects of human activity before panning back out to

celebrate earth's grand design. The poet here, serving as witness to climate change while advocating for preservation and conservation, invites readers to open themselves to earth's suffering—to global sorrow—in order to transform and be transformed.

Facing Aridity is part of the tradition of poems as essays stanzas that survey, testify, and persuade, even as they delight. I'm particularly struck by Woodcock's integration of technical diction and sound-play, as in "Arctic Summer, Sozzled on Landscape": "scree slopes, unconsolidated deposits / fluvial and beach—moraines, talus / cones, block fields of frost-loosened stones...alpine peaks—sharp and steep— / of granites and gneisses." Every page brings fresh knowledge and an immediate, inhabited dialogue with nature ranging across several key climates, right down to Svalbard poppies, Everglade alligators, and Hippocampus Kudas gliding in the Arabian Gulf. This collection is an important contribution to the canon of environmental literature that includes timely commentaries on both the aftermath of the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic, and the ongoing disaster of fracking practices in the United States.
